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## Message from the University President

# 2021 IN REVIEW

To say that 2021 was a bumper year for Quezon City University is an understatement. We started the year adapting the word and acronym FOCUS because we truly believed that keeping our eyes on the target was going to be the key to our year of abundance. It was an acronym that stood for:

Faith in God,  
 Opportunities abound despite the crisis,  
 Communication is important,  
 Utilize technology,  
 Self-less service.

Institutional recognition from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) was our primary goal and as soon as the year started, every unit in QCU contributed to ensure that QCU was acknowledged as a University that delivers quality education. With an unwavering faith in God and each other plus the opportunity to be given the time to put together the ordinances required to comply with mandatory requirements, team QCU was awarded the coveted Institutional Recognition (IR) inscribed in CHED En Banc Resolution No. 105-2021 of March 17, 2021. In the record time of three months from when we began our term, our primary mission has been accomplished. What does it mean for QCU to be Institutionally recognized?

- It is a testament that QCU has a clear direction as specified in its 5-year Institutional Development Plan. This means assurance to achieve our vision in within 5 years, that is “#1 QCU: to be the number 1 local university of employable graduates.”
- It is a stamp of approval for QCU’s programs in Entrepreneurship, Information Technology, Industrial Engineering, and Electronics and Communications Engineering. All our course offerings have Certificates of Program Compliance. This means a QCU education has met the standards of quality.
- This IR will give QCU the access to research and development grants to enhance our research and public engagement capabilities, to enable internationalization of our programs, and further expand our course offerings.
- For our faculty and staff, the IR makes them eligible to apply for scholarship grants for their master’s and doctorate degrees.
- Most important of all, QCU’s IR means that all our students can benefit from free tuition and other miscellaneous fees from CHED-UniFAST.

Our intensive communication with stakeholders to ensure that the delivery of education is unhampered and remains effective, resulted in putting the technology infrastructures in place. Mayor Joy Belmonte’s program to provide 8,250 laptops along with pocket WIFIs was facilitated by the Education Affairs Unit. Parallel provisions of laptops and pocket WIFIs, were also made available to faculty members. Harnessing technology in our teaching and learning, bundled with our learning continuity plan, together with an intensive and inclusive vaccination program for our students, faculty



and employees, our education delivery was unhampered. Determined to concentrate on quality assurance, we started the long but worthwhile journey of accreditation by submitting our academic programs to evaluation by the Association of Local Colleges and Universities Commission on Accreditation (ALCU COA). Also, by the end of the year our campuses obtained the safety seals in preparation for limited face-to-face classes.

While several universities experienced a decline in their number of enrollees, QCU saw an increase in enrollment for QC students. For the first semester of academic year (AY) 2021-2022, our enrolment rate grew by 14.5% compared to the previous year with 10,850 forming a robust student body.


Major strides in support of our core functions as a university, in terms of instruction, research, extension, and production were also accomplished with the crafting of QCU's research and extension agenda and operations' manuals. The Board of Regents' approval of these pertinent documents is expected to bolster our research and extension capabilities.

We have also embarked on a partnership with Miriam College which trained the faculty members of Information Technology and Engineering on design thinking to develop teaching modules for QC's out-of-school youth. The partnership paved the way for QCU to offer Early Childhood Education next academic year. We have established linkages with educational and research institutions in Indonesia, Malaysia, and Thailand. A grant from the USAID enabled the launch of Executive Course for Barangay Leaders on Service Delivery Programs for OSY.

The Speaker Feliciano Belmonte Center for Continuing Education hosted the initial executive course on organizational management that supported the training of middle-level government officers from the Senate, Congress, Armed Forces of the Philippines, and QC Hall. The creation of the Center for Urban Agriculture and Innovation was also approved by the Board of Regents. With our existing farm models in all our campuses and the initial five hives of a bee apiary, the center is envisioned to host urban agriculture training, module production, and research initiatives.

Since the start of the pandemic, QCU participated in our government efforts to address this crisis. We have made our facilities available - KorPhil and our grounds for HOPE 2, Belmonte Hall for our health workers' quarantine quarters, and Tech-Voc Building as a Vaccination site. Our campuses have also served as site for SAP distribution. All our nurses have been deployed to vaccination sites. We have conducted research in partnership with QC on special concern lockdown areas. We have contributed our buildings, bodies, and brains to avert this COVID crisis. The men and women of QCU has rendered self-less service so we are ready for the next normal.

In 2021, each day was an opportunity for joy and we are grateful!

## Our History

The Quezon City University, formerly known as the Quezon City Polytechnic University, came into existence on March 1, 1994, by virtue of the City Council Ordinance No. SP-171. The institution was created to undertake skilled workers' training in response to the manpower requirement by industry and business establishments within the city. The organization of the Polytechnic as a local government educational institution included the old Skills and Training Center. The QCP established its reputation among local government units as a show window and model technology-based institution, paving the way for its recognition by the Technical Education Skills and Development Authority (TESDA) and developing a strong alliance with the Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

On August 20, 1997, the Polytechnic was enhanced into a University through City Council Ordinance No. SP-544, S-97. The leadership of former Quezon City Mayor Feliciano "Sonny" Belmonte saw meaningful access to higher education. Starting 2005-2006, the University has started offering degree programs. Initially, the courses are BS in Entrepreneurial Management, BS in Information Technology, and BS in Industrial Engineering. SP-1945, s. 2009, otherwise known as "An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. SP1030, s. 2001 (or the QCPU Charter)", passed by the Quezon City Council, grants Quezon City Polytechnic University semi-autonomy as to its fiscal management and control over its operations, budgeting and reporting requirements. Under the Ordinance SP-2308 s. 2014, the QC Council authorizes the University to offer the Senior High School Program as mandated by the Department of Education. In July 2019, the SP-2812 s.2019 or the "Ordinance converting the Quezon City Polytechnic University to Quezon City University and enhancing its charter" was fully implemented.

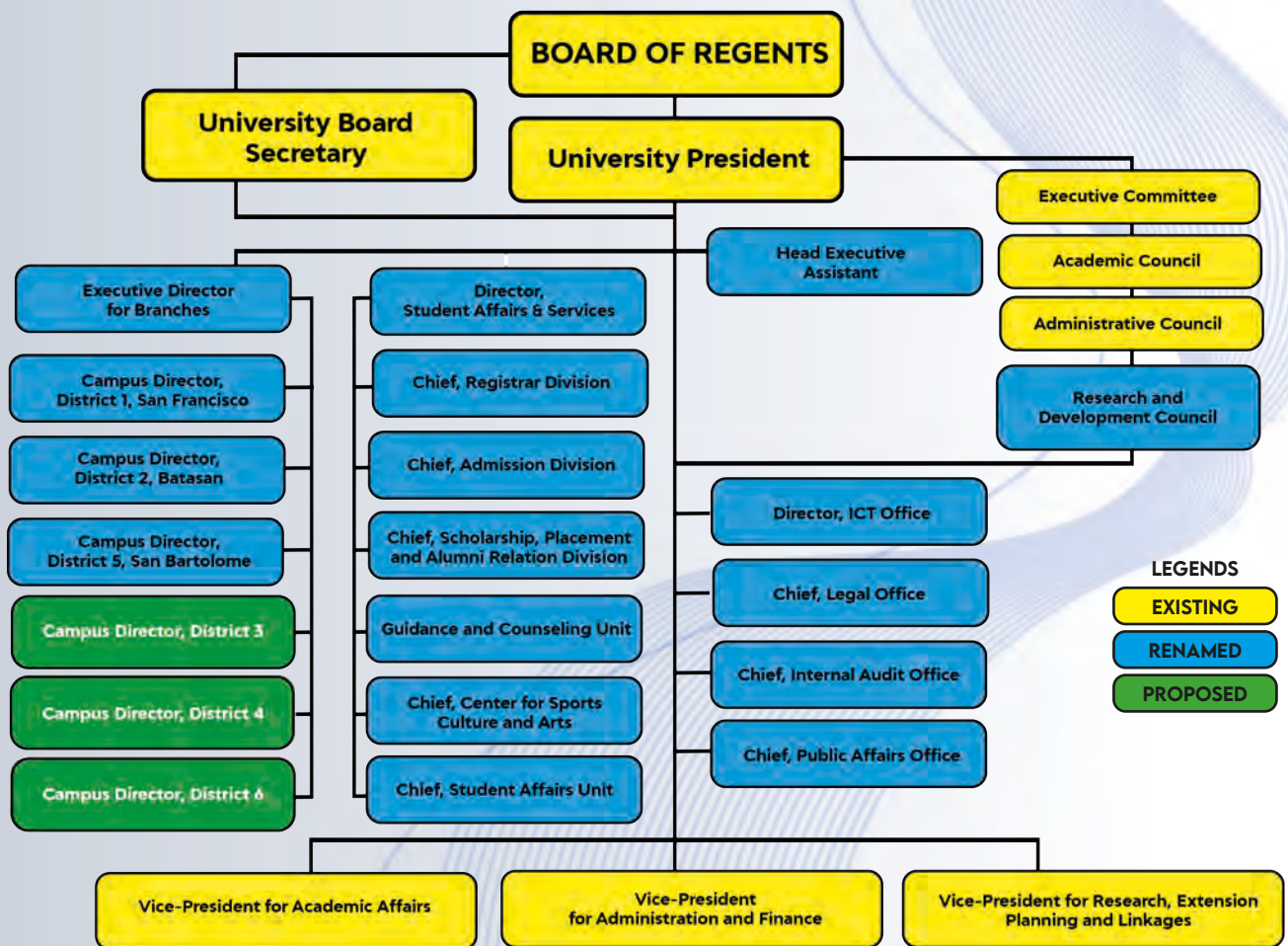

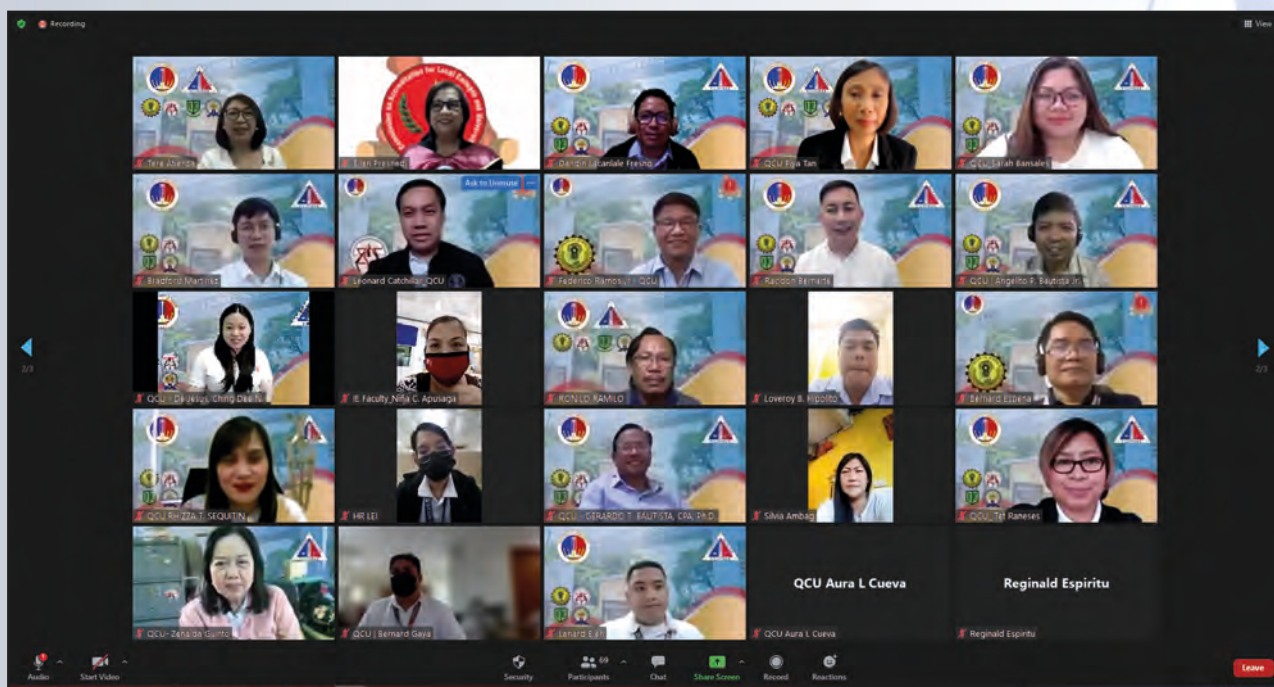
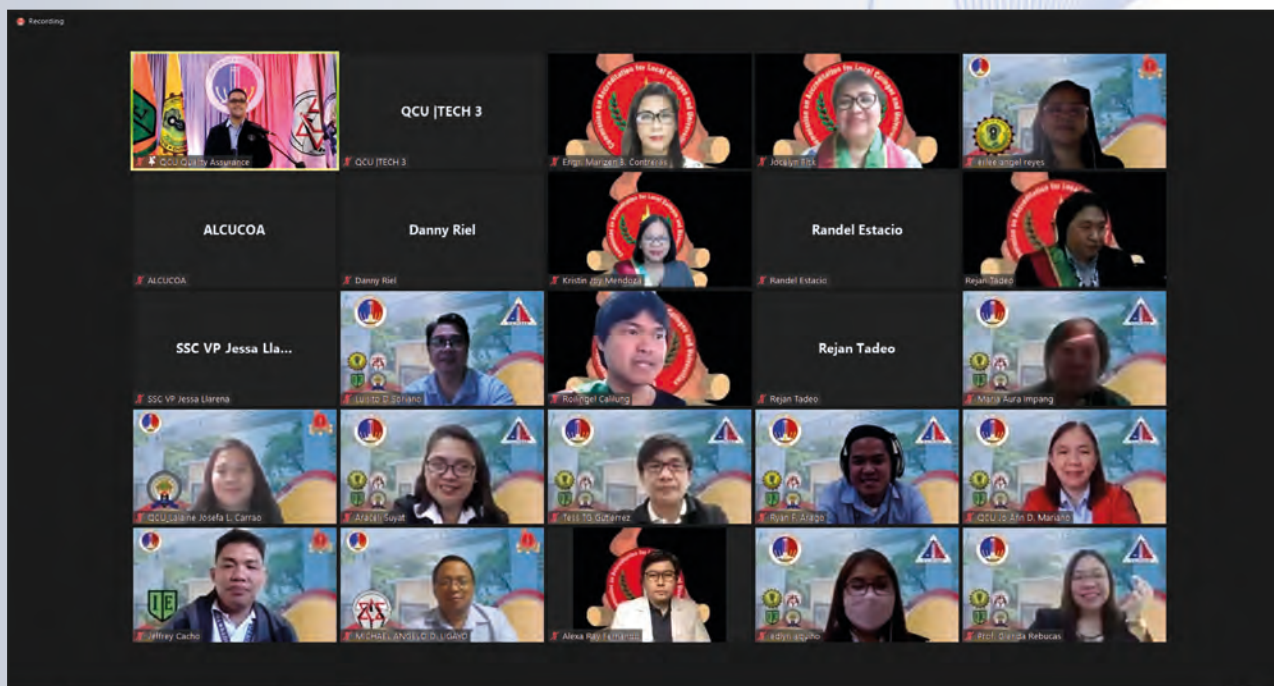
# ALCUCOA Preliminary Accreditation of the Four Programs

# The QCU Speaker Feliciano Belmonte Center for Continuing Education

The QCU Speaker Feliciano Belmonte Center for Continuing Education, a newly created center which offers short courses to educate and empower faculty members, personnel and staff of the Quezon City Government, launched its pilot course called Executive Course on Organizational Management. The objective of the course is to provide public managers and potentials with insights on the concepts of organizational structure. 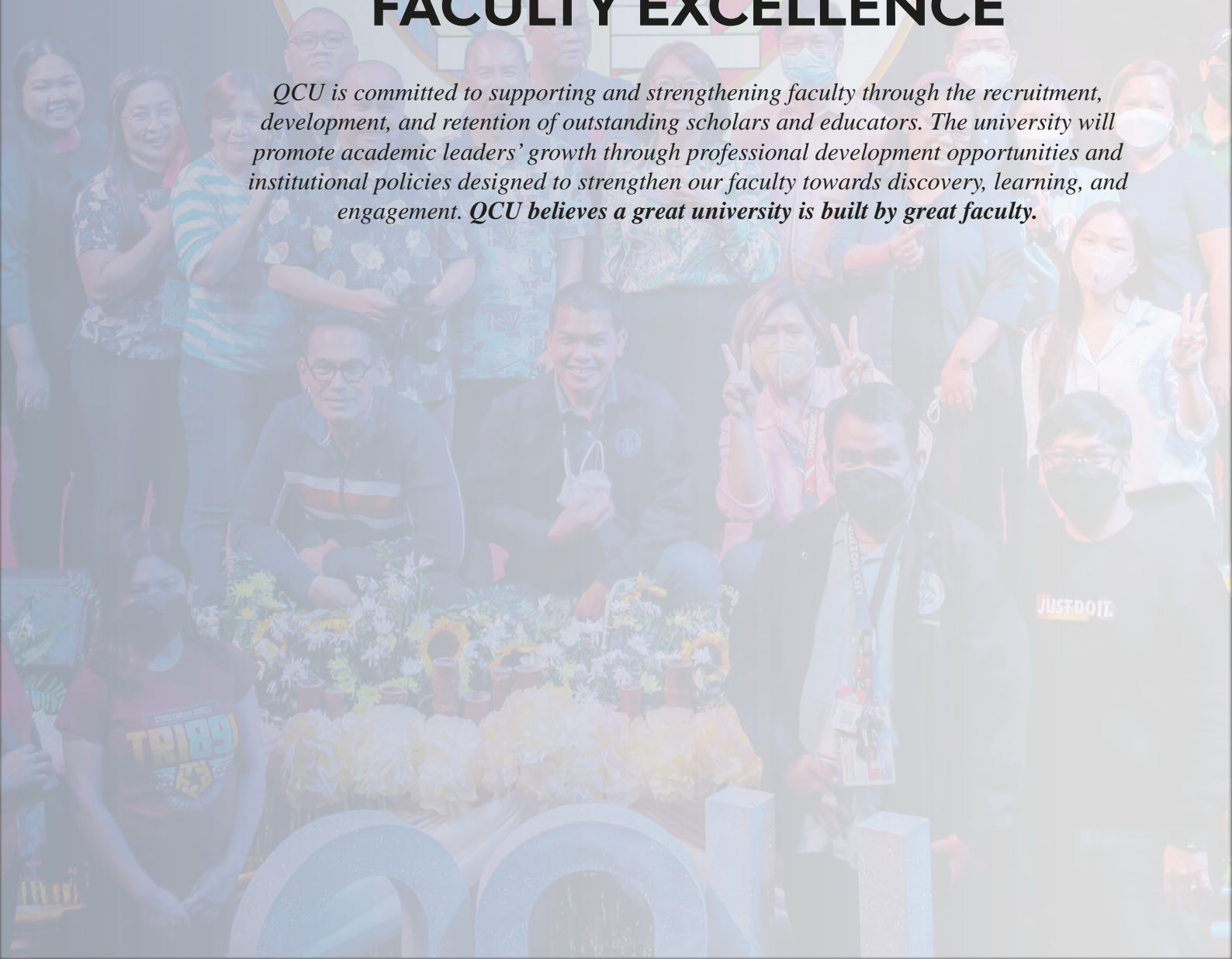

# Faculty Research Load

In 2021, the QCU Board of Regents (BOR) signed a board resolution institutionalizing a 3-unit research load for all plantilla faculty members. The research load will be given in four terms or semesters, which aims to further strengthen the University's research efforts and enhance the faculty members' research production capabilities. Faculty members with research load are expected to produce quality research output that are presented in reputable conferences and published in refereed journals. This effort was also lauded by the ALCUCOA for being one of the university's best practices in the area of research. More than twenty eight (28) research proposals and outputs have been produced by the faculty members in Academic Year 2020-2021 alone.



## Miriam College-QCU Partnership on USAID Opportunity 2.0 Module Development Workshop



QCU also partnered with the Miriam College in the conduct of the “Capacitating HEIs in Developing and Implementing Holistic and Relevant Programs for Out of School Youth Program” funded by the USAID Opportunity 2.0 program through the Education Development Center. Select QCU Faculty Members took part as participants in the faculty training. The module development program aims to assist the University in crafting relevant curricular programs that will cater to the needs of the OSYs. More than 53 faculty members and administrators joined the once-a-week Zoom training, which runs through December 2021 to March 2021.

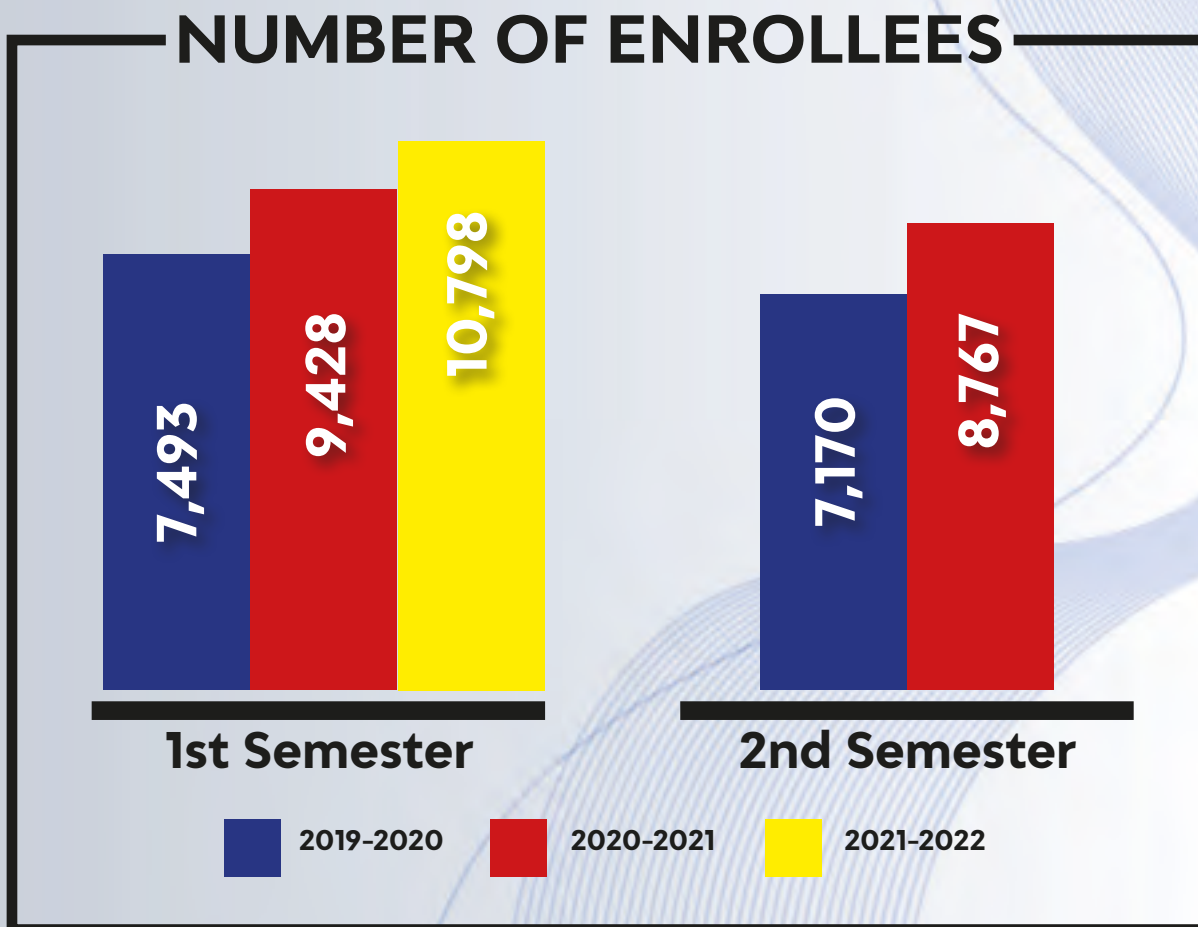

# Better Access to Quality Education

As of first semester AY 2021-2022, a total of 10,798 students were given a chance to acquire quality and affordable tertiary education through the five programs of the Quezon City University (QCU), the only local university in the city. The number of enrollees during the first semester of AY 2021-2022 increased by 14.5% from the previous school year despite the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.





# The New Flex: Enabling Distance Learning in the Middle of the Pandemic

In response to the challenges brought by the pandemic and to ensure unhampered learning of students, QCU implemented a Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) to adopt key strategies such as re-designing the learning environment while observing flexibility. QCU has rolled out laptops and pocket WiFis to students to facilitate the continuity of the learning process. The Quezon City Government allotted PHP 168,666,250.00 million, which was used to acquire and distribute 8,250 laptops for all students and faculty members of the University. Another PHP 9,701,250.00 million was used to purchase 9,750 pocket WiFis. The local government also allocated Php 15,788,520.00 for the continual internet connection for the students.



While it had been riddled with challenges, Quezon City and QCU have risen above them. With the return to limited face-to-face classes now in sight, the University now shifts its focus on retrofitting its campuses to ensure that safety and health of the returning students are prioritized. Still, the blended mode of learning will continue to be implemented as it has proven to be an effective mode of delivery of education.





# Unified Student Financial Assistance System for Tertiary Education

The institutional recognition bestowed upon QCU also entitled the University to receive approximately PHP 67,776,690.74 as part of the benefits provided for by the Unified Student Financial Assistance System for Tertiary Education or UniFAST for the 2nd Semester of AY 2020-2021. 8,765 qualified scholars of the University received full tuition and miscellaneous fee support through this program. Likewise, the students may apply and be eligible for various CHED scholarships and financial assistance such as the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES), Student Loan Program (SLP), and the Tulong Dunong Program.

For the Summer of AY 2020-2021, PHP 578,187.95 was granted by UniFAST to QCU for the tuition fees of 199 enrolled students. The graduation fees for the 584 graduates amounting to PHP 321,200.00 was also billed to the agency. As for the 1st Semester of AY 2021-2022, QCU had a total of 10,798 enrolled students and was granted P77,630.62 by the agency.

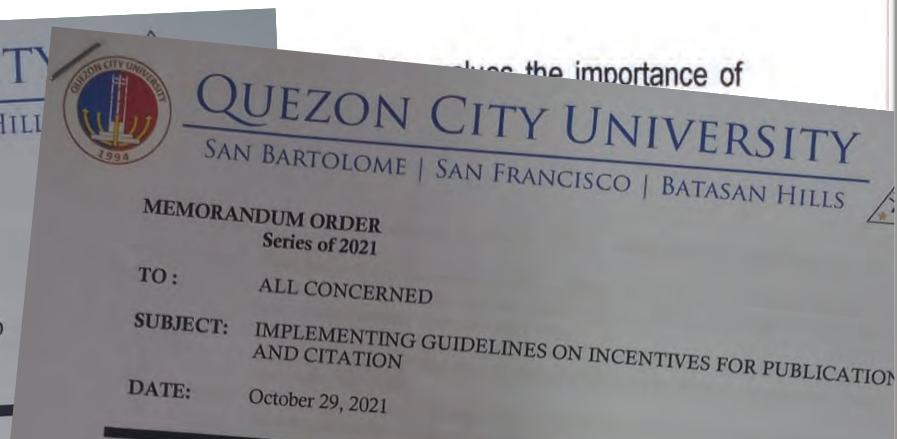
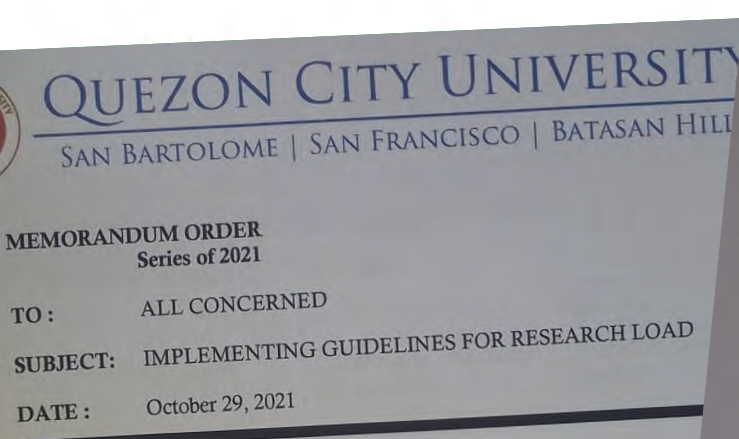

# QCU's Joy in Urban Farming



Upon the assumption of President Theresita V. Atienza, research and development in the area of urban agriculture has established 45 community urban farms and garden sites in the city with 56 signed memorandum of partnerships to create a culture of outreach and community engagement. This was made possible through innovative teaching, application of professional expertise, and strong collaborations with various stakeholders.

Faculty experts through the National Service Training Program (NSTP) have conducted urban farming seminars, distribution of seedlings, vegetable crops, hulls, re-purposed agricultural tools, and starter kits.



# QCU Campuses in service of the Community

All QCU campuses (San Bartolome, San Francisco, and Batasan) have urban farm models, and have served as venues for community trainings on livelihood and urban farming in partnership with the NSTP Department, QC Public Employment Service Office (PESO), the Joy of Urban Farming project, and the QC Sustainable Development Affairs Unit.

A small-scale bee farm was also established in October 2021 at the San Bartolome Campus with an initial acquisition of five (5) bee colonies. The University intends to fully utilize and make this farm operational by undergoing periodic inspection and trainings from bee experts and eventually bring down the model to communities.



## QCU Center for Urban Agriculture and Innovation

QCU has secured the approval of the Board of Regents, chaired by Mayor Joy Belmonte, in establishing the Center for Urban Agriculture for the university to contribute in addressing the problems of food supply and security especially during the pandemic.

QCU also signed a Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Agriculture and the QC Sustainable Development Affairs Unity (QCSdaU) in establishing the Center.



# HOPE 2.0 and Vaccination Efforts



At the height of the pandemic, QCU also served as a health and isolation facility for COVID-19 patients. The University has been actively contributing to the LGU's COVID-19 efforts in terms of facilities, manpower, educational resources, and training.

The University also initiated vaccine drives for its students, employees and their families where more than 600 were inoculated with COVID-19 vaccines in preparation for the face-to-face classes.



# Stronger Linkages and Partnerships



To ensure the continuous growth and development of QCU, the University has established academic collaborations, linkages, and partnerships with several local and international organizations such as the Miriam College, the Southeast Asian Ministers of Education Organization - Regional Centre for Early Childhood Care Education and Parenting (SEAMEO – CECCEP), Bina Insani University of Indonesia, and Research Synergy Foundation (Indonesia). QCU has also forged extension partnerships with several community organizations and became an institutional member of the Association of Local Colleges and Universities Commission on Accreditation (ALCUCOA) and the Asia Pacific Consortium of Researchers and Educators, Inc. (APCORE).

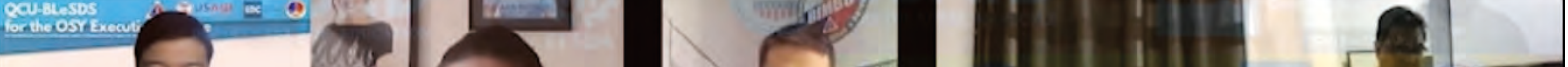

# Advancing The Welfare of The Out-Of-School Youth

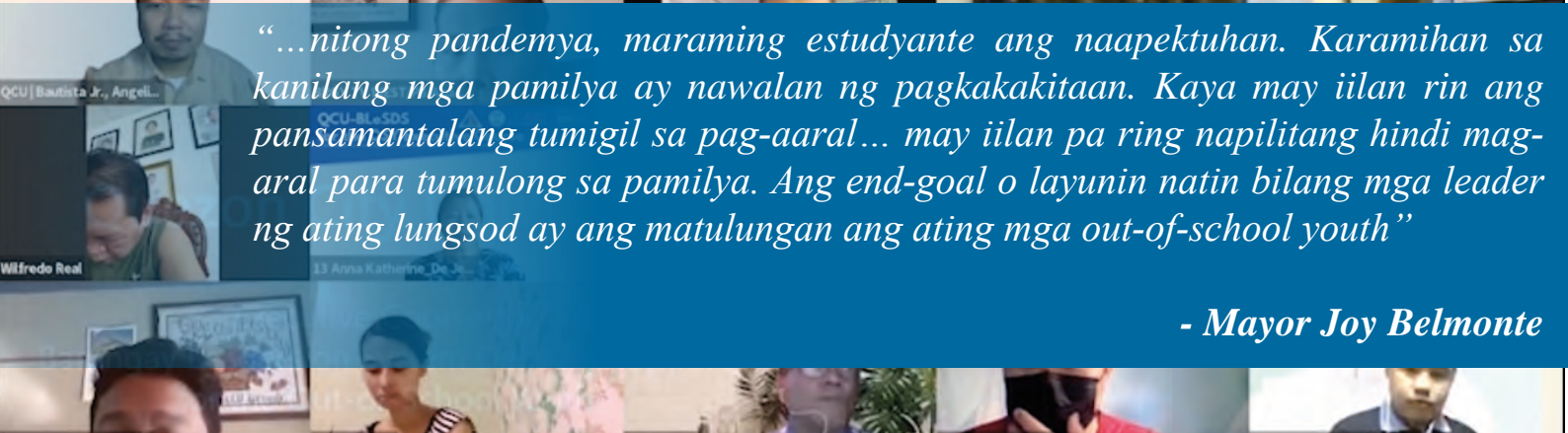



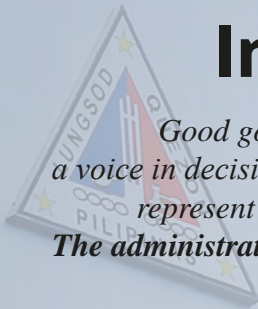

## THE QCU DA-ATI PARTNERSHIP

In 2021, QCU, in partnership with the Department of Agriculture - Agricultural Training Institute (DA-ATI), in established the Center for Urban Agriculture and Innovation that will cater to the needs of various stakeholders for program components related to Urban Agriculture training and extension; market, human capacity, and capability development; land use planning and management; and policy advocacy. Construction of the Center has started and is expected to be completed within the next two years. The Center for Urban Agriculture and Innovation intends to provide trainings and provide technologies in the advancement of urban farming practices.

## NEW QCU ACADEMIC BUILDING

Construction of the seven-story academic building is ongoing, which will soon house the expanded library (with meeting rooms, a digital library and a coffee shop), lecture rooms, AVR, faculty lounge, clinic, a multipurpose area, and the guidance counselor's office. Upon completion, this building will have 6,000 sqm of total floor area with 26 lecture rooms, an AVR, and 8 meeting rooms.
